P.S. 69 Grading Policy

Last year, our School Leadership Team, with the support of our teachers, reviewed and made changes to our Grading Policy to reflect a more consistent, equitable, and transparent manner to communicate student progress and what our students have learned. We have refined the criteria and have agreed on the following policy which is consistent across all the grades and subjects. We have three marking periods generally ending in November, March, and June; the last marking period grade is also the final grade for the year. Below are the grades as they appear on the report card.

Reading and Writing assessments are graded according to a 4, 3, 2, 1 rubric. We also give tests which are converted according to the following scale:
